Psychological & Mental Profile Analysis — with Legal & Ethical Risks

Potentially Unlawful or Ethically Questionable Behavior

1. Physical Aggression – Admission of a Headlock

"I got a bit excited and put one of them in a headlock..."

- Legal Implication: This is a confession of physical assault, potentially criminal if done without consent—even in a joking or "playful" context.
- Risk Factor: Demonstrates poor emotional regulation, boundary issues, and a lack of awareness of appropriate conduct with staff/volunteers—particularly concerning in a workplace with minors.

2. Targeting Other Charities & Shops

"We're not gonna let these greedy people ruin what we're trying to do..."
"...charging £7.50 for a used Asda dress is not what charity is about."

- Ethical Concern: The speaker openly slanders competitors (including legitimate registered charities) without evidence.
- Legal Implication: If named publicly, these comments could constitute defamation, especially if harmful to reputations or business.
- Psychological Marker: This reflects high tribalism, paranoia, and a tendency to externalize blame—common in narcissistic or high-control personalities.

3. No Financial Oversight / Wage Transparency

"I take no wage... [but] I've spent nearly 3 grand of my own money on this..."

"I don't put nothing through the till for myself."

- Red Flag: This suggests lack of proper accounting, receipts, or tracking—particularly if cash or donated goods are being moved without till entries.
- Legal Implication: Even unregistered or unincorporated organizations handling public donations must keep accurate financial records. Failure to do so can be classed as misappropriation or fraud.

• **Risk Factor**: The speaker appears to **self-appoint as financial controller** without external checks—a hallmark of rogue operations.

4. Under-18s Allegedly Volunteering Without Safeguarding

"The kids that volunteer here are good kids."

- Legal Implication: UK safeguarding laws require:
 - Enhanced **DBS checks** for anyone working around minors
 - Parental consent and proper working hour limits
 - Health & safety training and insurance coverage
- Concern: No mention of any of these. If true, the speaker is potentially
 endangering minors and violating child labor and safeguarding legislation.

5. Operating as a "Charity" Without Being Registered

"I don't claim to be a registered charity..."
"...but we're doing better than any of them."

- Red Flag: Despite denial, she uses charity language, solicits donations, offers transport, and collects items under charitable pretense.
- Legal Implication: Under UK law:
 - Using the term "charity" for fundraising without registration can be considered false representation.
 - Acting "for the public good" while handling funds/donations without oversight may breach Charities Act 2011 if the income is above £5,000.
- Psychological Pattern: Reframes lack of compliance as a moral virtue (anti-establishment righteousness)—this is common in delusional altruism or pseudo-messianic leadership styles.

Other Negative Psychological Traits Linked to Risk

| Trait | Description |

| Control-Freak Leadership | Makes decisions unilaterally, with no apparent oversight or board. Suggests risk of coercion, burnout among helpers, and poor governance. |
| Manipulative Framing | Justifies ethically murky actions as being "for the greater good." |
| Hostile Attribution Bias | Believes external parties (landlords, other charities, councils) are out to exploit or sabotage her. |
| Exploitative Benevolence | May be using the façade of helping others to feed a need for control, recognition, or emotional validation. |
| Delusions of Grandeur | Claims of "being headhunted" as a tenant, and running better than all local charities—possible narcissistic ideation. |
| Neglect of Safeguards | No indication of insurance, safeguarding policy, training, or data protection processes. Suggests dangerous negligence. |

Legal (Physical)



Admitted physical contact (headlock) – potentially assault.

Legal (Safeguarding)

↑ Under-18s present, no evidence of DBS checks or policy compliance.

Legal (Charity Law)

Acting as a de facto charity without registration or clear transparency.

Financial Oversight



No documented audit, till entries not used for all transactions.

Defamation Risk

Nerbally attacks other shops/charities publicly – reputational damage.

Emotional Volatility

Manifests in obsessive overwork, mood swings, verbal aggression.

Leadership Structure

X No evidence of external accountability, governance, or volunteer protection.
